Access to LTC Ombudsman

CMS-certified nursing home must provide LTC Ombudsman with immediate access to any resident.

In-person access may be limited due to infection control concerns and/or transmission of COVID-19; however, in-person access may not be limited without reasonable cause.

Representatives of the Office of the Ombudsman should adhere to the core principles of COVID-19 infection prevention.

If in-person access is not advisable, must have alternate means of access (e.g., phone or virtual visitation).

Updates – LTC COVID-19 Antigen Point-of-Care Testing

September 18, 2020

HHS Distribution of Point-of-Care (POC) Testing to LTC

Background

- Antigen POC testing machines (Quidel or BD) and initial allotment of test kits to nursing homes
- Antigen tests (BinaxNOW) to nursing homes and assisted living

CLIA Certificate of Waiver is Required for Point-of-Care Testing

- Facilities conducting POCT must obtain appropriate certification and comply with Illinois CLIA rules: <u>http://www.dph.illinois.gov/topics-</u> <u>services/health-care-regulation/CLIA</u>
- Per HHS/CMS, they will distribute POCT to nursing homes and AL only if they have a CLIA waiver. Nursing home deadline: Sept 30. AL deadline unknown
- Facilities that already had a waiver for other testing will need to fill out a CLIA Certificate Type Change form to add Antigen COVID-19 testing: <u>http://www.dph.illinois.gov/sites/default/files/forms/clia-certificate-type-change-012318.pdf</u>

Reporting Requirements

- Facility must report all POC testing results to public health authorities, as required by federal law.*
- Ultimately, nursing homes will report patient-level positive and negative results to NHSN
 - New module estimated to be ready Oct 15
 - Will require facilities to transition from SAMS level 1 access (aggregate reporting) to SAMS level 3 (patient-level reporting; requires two-factor authentication). May take 4 weeks once process is started

Increasing LTCF SAMS Level Access to NHSN

Step 1 – Receive Communication from SAMS

The CDC will submit a request to increase your security level access. Check your email inbox for communication from SAMS, via sams-no-reply@cdc.gov, requesting two forms of identification (ID)*.

*An email will be sent to you 3 to 5 business days after the SAMS access request.

*You must provide one (1) unexpired document from List A and one (1) additional unexpired document from List B. A copy of each ID must be included in your submission.

Reporting Requirements (cont)

Until the NHSN solution for reporting is ready, IDPH is creating a new system for reporting POC testing results using the REDCap platform.

- Each facility will need to register in this system with their CLIA certificate number and a point-of-contact email address using this link: <u>https://redcap.dph.illinois.gov/surveys/?s=XJARKWRP7E</u>.
- 2. Once the system is ready and the registration is processed:
 - Point-of-contact will receive a unique link to begin reporting positives and negatives.
 - Note: While waiting for access to this new system, please report any
 positives to I-NEDSS. If your facility doesn't have I-NEDSS access, please
 report positives to your local health department.

Ag Testing Q&A

- Q: Can we continue to use our lab for PCR testing or are we required to use the antigen tests?
 - A: If a facility has a lab that can do RT-PCR and has a quick turnaround time, they may continue to use the lab.

• Antigen POC testing is just one tool to conduct testing.

- Q: We got a BD machine and BinaxNow tests. Which should we use?
 - A: You may use either. Remember to follow instructions for use for whichever method you use. Consider using consistent approach to testing (e.g., if doing a round of HCP testing, use one method at a time)

Ag Testing Q&A

- Q: Once we start reporting POC results to REDCap, do we still report to INEDSS?
 - A: No. The POC reporting system in REDCap will replace direct POC reporting to INEDSS.
- Q: I work at a local health department and have received routine HCP testing results from a LTC facility that are all negative. What should I do with those?
 - A: For now, these are useful for situational awareness. Once the REDCap system is in production, facilities will need to report all negatives there.
